


Vaccines Save Lives


Vaccines save 5 million lives, every year.

In your lifetime, you were probably vaccinated against many harmful viruses like:

- Chickenpox
- Diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (DTaP)
- Hepatitis (A, B, C)
- Human papillomavirus (HPV)
- Measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR)

- Meningitis
- Pneumococcal (PCV13)
- Polio
- Rotavirus (RV)
- Influenza (seasonal flu)







About COVID-19 Vaccines


- Vaccines can help end the pandemic.
- Vaccines are safe.
- Vaccines are effective.
- All Pennsylvanians 16 years old or older can get the vaccine now.





How Vaccines Work

- Vaccines help our bodies develop immunity to a specific virus without us getting the actual illness.
- Different types of vaccines work in different ways to offer protection. But, with all types of vaccines, the body develops "memory" cells that will remember how to fight the virus in the future.





- Researchers have been studying and working with mRNA (messenger RNA) vaccines for decades.
- The FDA holds them to the same safety and effectiveness standards as all other types of vaccines in the U.S.
- You cannot get COVID-19 from the vaccine since they do not use the live virus that causes COVID-19.
- mRNA vaccines do not interact with, affect, or change your DNA.





Authorized COVID-19 Vaccines

The best COVID-19 vaccine is the first one available to you.

- The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has given Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) to COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson/Janssen.
- The Pfizer and Moderna vaccines require two doses.
- The Johnson & Johnson vaccine only requires one dose.





Johnson & Johnson Vaccine

- In April, the use of the Johnson & Johnson vaccine was paused for 10 days while the federal government investigated reports of a very rare blood clotting side effect.
- The pause is proof that these vaccines are being closely monitored to ensure safety.
- Through an intensive investigation, the FDA and CDC determined the vaccine's significant benefits far outweighed the rare risks.
- The side effects were incredibly rare only about 1 in 1 million vaccines administered up to that point.
- Since then millions more doses of Johnson & Johnson vaccine have been administered.



- The authorized COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective.
- These vaccines continue to be monitored for rare adverse events that may not have been seen in trials.
- Even though COVID-19 vaccines were developed quickly, no steps were skipped.
- The clinical trials for these vaccines included tens of thousands of volunteers with diverse genders, ages, and ethnic backgrounds (including communities of color).



- If you are pregnant, you are at increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.
- Three leading professional organizations focused on pregnancy and fertility recommend COVID-19 vaccinations for pregnant people and those considering pregnancy.
 - American Society for Reproductive Medicine
 - American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists
 - Society for Maternal Fetal Medicine
- There is evidence that vaccinated mothers can pass COVID-19 antibodies onto their children in the womb.



Potential Side Effects

- Some people may experience side effects after getting vaccinated. These are normal and are signs that the body is building immunity.
- When they do occur, **side effects are usually temporary** and only last a few hours to a few days. Common ones include:
 - Pain, swelling, and redness at the injection site
 - Tiredness, chills, and headaches
- Scientific vaccine research shows that long-term health effects are very rare.
- There are no known effects on fertility from the vaccine.


MAKING YOUR APPOINTMENT

How to Get Your Vaccine in PA



Finding an Appointment

- Use our <u>Vaccine Finder</u> to find a vaccine provider in your area. Or you can call 1-800-232-0233.
- Text your zip code to GETVAX (438829) for English, or VACUNA (822862) for Spanish to find three possible vaccination sites near you, with phone numbers to call for an appointment.
- If you need help, call the PA Department of Health at 1-877-724-3258.
- If you are unable to leave home, contact your local Area Agency on Aging (AAA) for assistance.





Transportation to Appointments

- If you need a ride to get to your vaccine appointment, Shared Ride Programs can help.
- Our public transit systems also offer accessible transportation, which is often free or subsidized for older adults and people with disabilities.





Preparing For Your Appointment

- The vaccine is free.
- Expect to wait 15 minutes after your vaccination.
- Before your appointment, don't take over-the-counter medicine (ibuprofen, aspirin, or acetaminophen) to try to avoid possible side effects.
- Don't plan to get your COVID-19 vaccine at the same time as other vaccines.





Personal Information & Immigration Status

- You can get the COVID-19 vaccine without insurance or an ID.
- Your immigration status doesn't prevent you from being able to get the vaccine in Pennsylvania.
- Medical information in the U.S. is private and cannot be shared with immigration officials.





During Your Appointment

- Wait until your appointment time.
- Wear a mask that covers your nose and mouth.
- Keep your arm relaxed during the vaccination.
- You will get a vaccination card.
- The vaccination site will schedule your second appointment (only applicable for Pfizer and Moderna).





After Your Vaccine

- You may experience temporary side effects.
- You will be "fully vaccinated" two weeks after your last dose of your vaccine.
- As more people get vaccinated and cases start to decrease, restrictions may lighten.
- Pennsylvania set a goal that once 70% of adults are vaccinated the mask mandate can be lifted.





#GotMyShotPA

- Once you get your vaccine, tell people about it.
- Do not post your vaccination card on social media.
- Inspire others to get vaccinated by using #GotMyShotPA to proudly share your selfie on social media.



TALKING ABOUT VACCINES

How to Get Your Vaccine in PA



You can share facts about vaccines and other safety measures through:

- Virtual events, meetings, and presentations
- Op-eds, blog posts, or articles
- Conversations with colleagues, neighbors, family, and friends
- Social media posts, graphics, and videos
- Posting signs in businesses, workplaces, schools, places of worship, or other community locations

Most importantly, be an example for others. Educate yourself so you can help teach others. You have the power to show you care by making good choices and following health and safety recommendations.



How to Talk to Friends & Family

It's normal to have questions about new things. You can have a supportive and productive conversation with others by:

- Listening with empathy.
- Asking open-ended questions.
- Asking if you can share information.
- Helping them find their own reason to get vaccinated.
- Helping make their vaccination happen.
